
PURPOSE

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If the hero has a thousand faces, surely many must be Black. Yet African gods and goddesses rarely stand alongside more well-known European counterparts.

African mythology has been marginalized as "folk tales" and "mumbo jumbo," while Greek, Roman, Celtic and Norse mythologies, for example, have been promoted into the ranks of the world's great wisdom. Myths are more than just patently untrue narratives. They represent the deep and abiding truths that serve as foundations of a culture.

At this crucial moment, we must reckon with the myths that can inform our understanding of racial equity and "Black Lives Matter," myths whose African origins can lead us into the deep corridors of personal healing and the robust pathways of social action.


4: Been To The Mountaintop

Short films are considered to be scripts up to 25 pages.


Pilot scripts are considered to be scripts from 23-60 pages.

Clyde W. Ford, Ph.D. is an award-winning author, software engineer, a chiropractor, and a psychotherapist. Author of twelve works of fiction and non-fiction, including THINK BLACK, a memoir about his father, the first Black software engineer in America. In the mid-to-late 1990s, Ford's focus shifted to the use of mythology in healing. In 1999 Ford compiled his research on mythology in his fourth book, The Hero with an African Face. "Properly read, myths bring us into accord with the eternal mysteries of being, help us manage the inevitable passages of our lives, and give us templates for our relationship with the societies in which we live."
